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A regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Jamestown, New York was held on Monday, October 27, 2008 at 7:30 p.m.

Lamont DiDomingo, 115 Cole Avenue: I want to voice my concern on this No. 2 resolution here on this green sheet. I myself am not totally for that. I can't see it. I know I can go in every Federal Building in town; I can go to Mayville; I do not have to walk through one like that. When I come pay my property taxes or paying utility bills, I know I have to go through that. I just despise it. I really do. I had to go get a death certificate from the City Clerk. I had to get paged in to see her. I'm thinking – "you know, I have to go through this here, but yet, in the evening time, I go out; I see the same people that I have to see in there. I am not going to harm them, they're not going to harm me." I just don't see it. I really don't. I'm a public citizen here, I'm just trying to do my thing and I have to go through all this, plus I've got to find a place outside to park and not get a ticket. The other thing, cost savings things, I haven't heard much about sharing of services with the villages, okay. I do not know whether the City is making money on this or we're losing money, because maybe I see a lot of vehicles are needing to be purchased, a lot of vehicles are wearing out. We have to hire more employees. Is this because we have to continue the services to these villages and more employees are needed to cover this? I don't know. If there is a profit for selling the water off and maintaining the lines, that's great. But I'm not seeing it and I'm not hearing it. I just think that it's an awful lot for all our city employees having to run all over the place and take care of all these things and I, the taxpayer, am I paying more from my share for these services that others ones are getting? Maybe we are making money, but maybe announce it in the paper – show something – I have no idea. But you know that we owe a lot of money; everyone says that we're sound and stable when we owe like \$43,000,000 out there – I mean that's a lot of money – it really is; then have to go out and borrow more money which is this other \$4-5,000,000 because we need more vehicles, we need more things to fix in the City. I understand, but when it takes 17 years to pay these things off and buy new vehicles – I know

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they're not going to last 17 years. They're only going to last maybe 5 or 10 years, then you've got to buy new ones again, and we're still paying on the bill that you had before. I don't know. I know I run a plant in Ellicottville; I do know expenses; I do know people; I do know employees. I work every day and I work hard at what I do. I try to save my company money wherever I can. But I'm not allowed to go into debt. That's one thing that's a negative for me. They're not allowing me to do that and I won't do it to the company. At one time at one of your meetings, you were going to look at cost-savings issues – one was cell phone uses. I remember that, there was some talk about that and then it was tabled. You were going to wait and see what the County did on their cell phone use as a cost-saving factor. Well, the County made some adjustments or not, I haven't heard that being brought back up on the table again as maybe to look at for a cost-savings. The other thing is patrol cars. I look around – I see we have new patrol cars. That's great – I know we probably need them, I'm not saying we don't; I know we need new ones, that's true too. But I am concerned about the size of these vehicles. I know the Sheriff's Department has gone down to downsize their vehicles – they seem to be fine. I go to other communities – I see smaller downsized officer's cars. They seem to be doing fine for them. I'm saying – why do we have to have all these large gas-guzzling things in town where myself, could never afford to run them. I go back up to Ellicottville every day – I have to watch my fuel bill and I could never run one. I had one and I had to get rid of it. I downsized. I think something should be looked at there. I mean we're not traveling no real high speeds around this town – you don't need a big car for that. You don't need a big V8. On this fire truck – I know we needed one. I know we have one – it's like 100' long. I don't know how that gets around town. I had thought at one time when you bought the new one – you were going to get rid of the old...maybe I was wrong on this...but I find out now you've reinvested thousands of dollars into the old one to bring the old one back up – to keep it up. If that was the plan to keep the old one...I don't know...I must have missed that in the paper. I know the old one could get around town, it was smaller, and I think we should keep that, but with the bigger ones – I know one time I was at a location – that one could not get up the street. I don't know how you're going to get the new one up some of these streets in town with all the cars. I wonder about that. Leaf pickup -I live on Cole Avenue. When they came and got my leaves last year. I thought there was a parade coming. I'm being a little humorous. I never saw so many vehicles pickup my leaves on my street as that was. Then when I see a jeep come down across my lawn pushing all the leaves off on the street, tearing up my turf – the City didn't come back and fix up my lawn. I had to build back up and I had to fix the turf. I mean, I saw so many vehicles there. I look in Ellicottville – all they have is two guys with a suction thing there with a mulcher in back of the truck and it picks leaves up. Go down the street and they pick them up and they're done. I mean there must have been I don't know how many trucks, how many street cleaners, I mean it was something to see, and I thought that was a little overboard just for picking up leaves in the City. I won't say no more. Thank you for your time. I hope maybe some of these things have been beneficial, maybe not. I'd like you to consider them.

James Slagle, 110 W. Third St., Hotel Jamestown: First off, Mr. Mayor, I'm really getting concerned about the Wintergarden Theater. I worked in that theater for many years and please, don't let them tear it down because we can make use out of it. I was talking to one of the ones that have been doing all this remodeling in the City and they said one time that they wanted to remodel it – I mean re-do it – and bring back the old films like back in the '60's or something like that. It can be used for...if they can do it to the Palace Theater, they can do it to the Wintergarden. I've worked in both theaters. The Wintergarden has really brought more memories to me than the Palace has. But if you can see clear to check into this a little bit more, don't tear the building down. The roof's got to be fixed the guy told me. It's gotten a little bit wet inside but that all can be taken care of. I tell you, if I had the money – I'd buy it, I would, because that brings a lot of memories. Getting back to the streets – I thank you Jeff for keeping in contact with Bruce at the Hotel. Our sidewalks are going to be done on Cherry Street – thank God for that. I understand we're going to get a grant for the Cherry Street Parking Ramp and Spring

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Street Ramp – is that right Mayor? And there's going to be better lighting too. We really need it in both ramps. So, right now, they're doing the floor in our ramp – it's been blocked off for almost a month now. We have a lot of light problems in that ramp and we also...the elevator keeps going out. Every time we get a rain storm that goes out. They fixed it again yesterday and it's back running. How long – I don't know. Another thing – as I was coming down Washington Street to turn on Third Street – left turn – there should be a signal there, arrow, on that street, really, because it gets real dangerous. These people are flying up through off of Washington Street Bridge come out of there and you go to turn in, you're going to get hit. That ought to be Mr. Taylor's job right there to take care of that. I want to thank the people who are doing downtown...restoring our buildings...putting a new face on...have you seen it Mayor? It's starting to look good. These handicapped curbs that the people ride their wheelchairs on are getting bad. They're getting where the street is getting down below the pavement – they're not level. Now this one out here as I was coming across the street when I parked down here, that was in good shape. It's down mostly around the hotel and down in that area. I know it's going to take time to get this City back in shape again but I think Chief Rater – I hear your boys on the scanner every day – they're doing a good job in our City and I want to commend you for that. Mr. Mayor, you have a good Chief there in the Police Department. I want to thank all you Council for letting me come up here and talk to you and I'm not here to wave power or anything like that – I just want to see that my City is back like it used to be. But please, Mayor, don't let them tear down the Wintergarden – okay? Because I've worked in there many years and I worked under a good boss there – it can be fixed. Every time I go by, I start getting tears in my eyes. Thank you.

Peter Morgante, 134 Euclid Avenue: My purpose here is always over the property taxes of the senior citizens especially and the homeowners over issues. Now this budget that you're working on is a message of the agenda. I cannot understand how you think you can sit there through a budget meeting and go over items, each line item and think you can make cuts and cut the property taxes – it doesn't work that way. You think you're going to cut away a shovel, a broom, or something else like that and think you're going to cut the taxes – no. You've got to understand one thing and you don't understand because you don't have a business or run a business. There's three things of a budget. The workers – No. 1, the supplies and the equipment for the workers to work with No. 2 – and the operating of the buildings and the taxes and the utilities. That's three phases. And all you people ever do is try to cut away a little bit of equipment or a truck or something else like that and think you're going to balance the budget. It doesn't work that way. You've either got to cut employees, cut the benefits, cut the rents, cut the buildings, or something – that's where the costs are going to come from. You're not going to get them by going line by line and take away a little bit here and a little bit there and think you're going to cut the budget. It doesn't work that way. Now, Mr. Mayor, I'm driving down North Main Street today and there's a sign in the window "Mayor Teresi's for the People." Are you running for office again? I just can't believe it. But I promise you one thing – it can't be because your budget is the worse thing we've ever seen. You wouldn't be running for the Mayor's office on the budget that you're presenting to the people today. All it's got in there is more wages, increases for the people, more taxes on the homeowners, more debt service, more of this and more that, and no hope for any relief for the people. There's no hope in this budget for anybody. Nothing is in there for the homeowners and the people. It's a dead budget. I don't know what we're going to do.

Mr. Olson: Pete – you have to hold the microphone near your mouth, or I'm not going to be able to get a public record of what you're saying. You have to hold the microphone – you can't be holding it down; either that, or put it back on the rack and speak into it please. But you lowered it now compared to where I had it this afternoon. If you'd just leave it alone – it was going to work fine.

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Mr. Morgante: Okay. Alright. Thank you Mr. Olson. Now one other thing. You have operated this year on last year's budget people from the previous City Council and according to the records, you've spent everything out, the fund balance is down to zero. You've had to bond for all the new equipment – there's a million dollar bond on next year for your budget. You will be responsible for that. Everything in this budget you're going to be blamed for, and there's nothing there that's going to be good for what you're doing. Last City Council people, they promised us economical development with a property tax reevaluation. It's failed. Now all the property should be reassessed Mr. Mayor. I know on our street, there are \$20,000 losses on properties and something should be done about that because your tax budget depends on property tax issues. Now the only people that are prospering out of the economical development of the City is when we hire these people to come in and take jobs from out of town. We're hiring people to work for the BPU, we're hiring people to work for the County, and we're paying them fabulous salaries - \$84,000 for a personnel manager up in the County, or the City, or the BPU, I'm sorry, and I don't know what they're paying the guy at the Social Services in Mayville. But why is it that we have to keep hiring out of town people to come in and take the good jobs? And hoping that they're going to rent a house or buy a house in the City of Jamestown. That's the only economical development we're seeing in the City is for these new people to come in, return to Jamestown because at one time they were here, and now they're happy to be back but they're making big money. Why would these people leave jobs that they had – the same jobs, to come into Jamestown if we weren't overpaying them? Can anybody understand that stuff? It's ridiculous. You must have Jamestown people here that could take a job like that – I don't know, maybe we don't know about them. The last thing I want to get on is I think you people have got to get out onto the streets and talk to some of the businesses and see how bad off our City is financially. And the economical thing with the businesses is bad. I want to see somebody go down and talk to the doctors and the lawyers and the merchants and see how they're doing economically in our City. It's bad. Believe me. Thank you.

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exemption from the provisions of Chapter 204 of the Code of the City of Jamestown for November 8 – 9, 2008 so as to enable up to sixty (60) transient retail businesses to vend their product during the AAUW What's New Fair activities, now, therefore, be it

Mr. DeJoy: First off, I would just like to pass our condolences on on behalf of the City Council to a longtime DPW employee mechanic, Charlie Schauers, who died rather suddenly – I saw in this morning's paper and am sad to see him pass. I also wanted to comment on Mr. Morgante's comments. I don't believe that the fund balance is at zero, I think that our audit shows that from Mr. Trussalo that it's adequate, but it's absolutely not at zero and the fact that people are willing to move into Jamestown – professionals – to take some of these jobs, I'm sure that, and I know from the BPU that there was a thorough search conducted for the HR Manager. I think it's a testament to Jamestown that people want to move into Jamestown and want to buy a house here and bring their family here because it is a wonderful place to live. The fact that, as Councilman Dolce mentioned, some of this equipment – some of it will last the life of the bond – but part of our other management strategy is to keep turning over this equipment so it stays new and with State contracts not to...it won't cost us much money. In many instances we can actually make money and trade in, so I think it's all good. We're looking in a forward way as a business would do to manage our assets, and I just wanted to comment on that Mr. President.

Councilman Taylor: I just have a couple of additional comments, Mr. President. First, in addition to everyone that we have here, I just wanted to give a shout out to our friends from Falconer High School who came to be with us at our City Council meeting. Welcome. And, we hope you had a good time. Comment No. 2 – I was trying to warm up my singing voice and I won't need it now, but just to wish Councilwoman Ecklund a Happy Birthday, and I wanted to say that on the record. No. 3 – it's really been awhile since I've said anything at a Council meeting. We haven't had any resolutions out of Public Safety this month – I could guarantee there may be several next. Anyhow, the last thing I wanted to say is I appreciate very much the responses that Councilman DeJoy and Councilman Dolce respectively gave to some of the comments that were said during the public comment portion. A lot of times when people talk and a lot of times, we sometimes let things go because we know we have answered many of these questions plenty of times. But at the same time, there are those especially with the internet – a lot of people go on line – they read the minutes from the meetings and when you don't properly respond to some of these things, they take what was said in public session, or they'll take what may have been said on the radio, and they feel that we, the Council, haven't properly responded to some of those charges, some of those comments. So, I thank you for your public comments on those issues. The other thing that I wanted to say because it hasn't been said for several months...I wanted to commend Jeff and I wanted to commend the Department of Public Works. This is usually a change, I usually try to play "gotcha" with them at some meetings over things that haven't been done, but everything from what's happening on Camp Street to especially 6th Street, as well as the continuous efforts that we know we are going to see as far as picking up the leaves; winter's

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coming up; 2008's been a stellar job and I appreciate and our community appreciates all that you're doing for the Department of Public Works, so on behalf of the 3rd Ward, I wanted you to know that. That's all I have, Mr. President.

President Rabb: Are there any other comments or any other business to come before the Council?

Councilman Taylor: Just one more...

President Rabb: I thought we were...I think Mr. Dolce should go before you...

Councilman Dolce: I think Mr. Morgante made a mistake – that was my house that Sam's thing was in the window. He just looked on the wrong street.

President Rabb: And you had one more thing, Mr. Taylor?

Councilman Taylor: One more thing.
