Mr. McGuay: My name is Richard Edward McGuay senior. I live at 368 Buffalo Street, apartment 2. I'm having a get together with my doctor and I'd like to send an invitation to the president and the members of the city council because I think you're going to have a fun time there. It's June 29th at 2:00 pm. The Western New York Urology Association at 117 Foote Avenue, Suite 100. I'm going in for a medical procedure, but because of my health problems, the doctor cannot put me out. So, he's going to have to use a local anesthesia. That means I'll be awake during the whole process. Without me knowing it, he contacted my drugstore and ordered a prescription for me. The drugstore called me up and I went down and I picked up the prescription. They would not give it to me. They said, it is a narcotic. You must have a New York State driver's license, valid ID, in order to get it. I'm not going to argue that because I've been here before about those New York State driver's licenses, valid IDs. So, I went home. Later that evening, the drugstore called me up. Come on down and pick up your prescription. So, I went down there and I went and picked up the prescription and I showed no ID whatsoever. Even my Benefit card that's issued by the state with my photo on it. I did not even need that. The reason for that is, I cannot understand, this is a narcotic. It's not considered a medication according to the drugstore. It is a narcotic. So, maybe the police are trying to catch me with narcotics in my possession. And I have no New York State ID to prove who I am. So, my name on this means nothing. Or maybe what they're waiting for is for this procedure to take place and then I leave the doctor's office, I will still be under the influence of the narcotic. And then the police will arrest me for being under the influence of narcotics. I am 78 years old. If I am convicted of a narcotic charge, that means I'll spend the rest of my life in prison. And I am not about to take that chance. So, I brought the narcotic with me because I'm going to give it to the Chief of Police to dispose of. Because I am not going to be railroaded by any trumped-up District Attorney or crooked judge or crooked police officers on a drug charge. I've got too much to live for for that.

Mr. Rensel: Jim Rensel, Mayor of Village of Falconer, 101 West Main Street. I'm here again to respectfully ask that the city council stop their annexation initiative by way of review. On January 30, 2017, we read about the annexation initiative in the Jamestown Post Journal and since then, we've been advocating for you to stop this annexation initiative. Just so we understand each other – and if I have my numbers wrong, please feel free to correct me. According to the news article on that day, January 30th, the BPU would save \$162,000.00. \$80,000.00 payment would be made to the school and the city would receive an \$80,000.00 payment.

So, the way I see it, I mean we're going through this – what I can only describe as a scorched earth scenario here where you're coming across the line to take your property back into the city; for about \$162,000.00 a year. With all the millions of dollars you're getting in grants and different initiatives you have going, this is all about \$162,000.00? It's just unfathomable to me. I have a constituency that I'm advocating for. And the purpose, in my opinion, the purpose

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as I understand it, of the annexation hearing was to measure the different interests in this annexation initiative. From what I saw at that hearing, there is no interest on your side for the annexation. As I mentioned in the work session last week, I asked the question, I didn't get an answer, I wasn't asking rhetorically. I asked the serious question. Who are you representing if no one showed up at the hearing from your city of 31,000 people to advocate for this annexation? No one showed up. So, who are you representing?

In the most respectful way, I'm asking the members of the city council, and I want you to understand the environment I come from. Being mayor of Falconer I tried to increase our shelters, the price on our shelters to generate income and I had a difference of – I wanted five more dollars than another trustee did. We argued, our sides, the issue over \$5.00. For a village resident, mind you. For how much a village resident pays for a shelter in our Falconer Park. As mayor, I'm advocating my position with a trustee and the trustee is advocating their position. Over \$5.00, people. And we had a very good discussion, exchange of ideas and the trustee won out. I couldn't get the votes for the extra \$5.00 for our constituents when they rent a shelter.

I would like to see that on the city council. I just have to believe that there's members of the city council that recognize that this just isn't right. For \$162,000.00, this is what we're going through? For our neighbors? This is the example we're setting? Please. If there's some other reason, other than your constituency that's not showing up to show interest in this, or to ask you to advocate for them, what other reason is there? I'm going to ask the residents in the City of Jamestown. I know I have limited sway with you, obviously. I'm going to ask the residents in the City of Jamestown who are against this to make their voices heard. I had an opportunity to work at – to help raise money at one of your local businesses in the City of Jamestown. I helped hand out beverages and food and I introduced myself as the Mayor of Falconer when I'm doing this money-raising initiative. And I'm telling you, I had to apologize for the city several times because people would come in saying I can't believe what the city's doing, I don't agree with it. I invite any one of you one city council who wants to contact me personally to talk. If you're allowed to do that. Because when I asked who you're representing, you weren't allowed to answer that or something. I don't know. In conclusion, I respectfully ask you to reconsider this annexation initiative. For \$162,000.00 a year, we as neighbors, we shouldn't be going through this. I don't think Falconer did anything to you. I don't think the Town of Ellicott did anything to you. I don't think the school district did anything to you to deserve this kind of treatment. Thank you.

It is exposing to the world, eventually if it goes to court, state supreme court, it’s going to show people just how desperate Jamestown is; to take land from a neighboring community. To essentially invade a neighboring community. I mean, it’s one thing to go downtown and tell all these businesses, well Mr. Donuts, you’ve been here for years and years and years, but you’ve got to disappear. It’s one thing to try this trumped-up eminent domain, which is generally used in larger cities, not in cities the size of Jamestown. Jamestown is barely a city now, okay? My comments at the town meeting in Falconer were meant seriously. All these people started laughing, but it’s the truth. Jamestown needs to dissolve its current city charter. We need to reformulate a new one because these unions are draining money out of the city. Not to mention the millions upon millions of dollars that just aren’t there. That are going to these former employees and their medical insurance policies in this grainy contract that who knows how they were negotiated with the unions. It has to change because the city will go bankrupt; which would be a good thing. Because then it will have to re-form, possibly as a village. I’ll tell you right now, I never felt safer than when the State Police were out there stopping people on those roads. Freeing up the Jamestown Police to do investigative work. We need the Town of Ellicott Police, we need the State Police, we need the Sheriff’s Department. That way, the urban characters who are brought in here by the LOWS, the landlords on welfare. Mr. Tota: Hello. My name is Anthony Tota and I live at 144 Clifton Avenue in Jamestown. I just want to add to something that the Mayor and Mr. Gardner said. Mr. Mayor, the Mayor of Falconer cannot understand why this is over \$160,000.00. Well, this is exactly what this is over; \$160,000.00. Now, I have been reviewing the recent budgets from the Mayor for the last three years. And in that budget, where the Mayor has signed, his explanation of what’s happening in the city. He kind of repeatedly says that the city is in financial – is going to have foreseen financial problems continuing into the future. Now, with that kind of attitude, that attitude reflects the behavior. And that behavior is that you are going to – not going to do

anything to try to increase the economic part of development in the city. Now, what is happening with your budget is what you hear in the Post Journal; that you guys struggle over the budget for a period of weeks, crunching numbers. But crunching numbers on a budget is not going to solve your problems.

You need to increase the tax base, increase the revenue base. Because the results of crunching numbers every three years results in an increase in taxes because your tax base is shrinking. You're exempt tax base, which the mayor complains about, is generating from the State of New York and also in the City of Jamestown. He also talks about that in one of his budgets, one of his recent budgets. Well, the fact of the matter is the City of Jamestown supports tax exempt properties like the Lucy Comedy Center, the Lucille Ball Museum, the Lucille Wright museum on Third Street. Prime areas where an entrepreneur should go in and pay taxes and help the city's budget. This is a plan, this is something that is an intent. This is a behavior; over a period of 16 years, by this administration, which has resulted in higher taxes, evacuation of people leaving the area, businesses leaving the area creating vacant parcels and obviously, the parcels that are left have to pay more. Result, tax cap overrides approaching the constitutional limits. What does this have to do with \$160,000.00 from the BPU? Well the City of Jamestown needs it. Now that the city has got to the tax cap ceiling, why would they need more revenue because they're not going to get it from taxes anymore, is to profit structure in the BPU by eliminating \$350,000.00 or whatever that amount is, payments to the Town of Ellicott. That profit structure is, as the Mayor has stated as we approached the tax cap last year is going to be used that extra profit, not only for profits, but generating taxes for the BPU. That's what this is all about. Getting the extra money from the profit structure of the BPU, getting the extra money from the tax base of the BPU; which the Mayor, in his own village and his budgets, claims that the BPU is tax exempt. Over \$100 million signed by the Mayor. Yet, in 2016 the BPU electric division alone paid over \$2 million in taxes and the average profits from the electric division I believe was around \$482,000.00. And the Mayor says that is being threatened this year along with the constitutional tax limit. So, where is the money going to come from? The administration has decided it's going to come from the Town of Ellicott and the Village of Falconer. And you were aware of it in October of last year when the executive budget was out and they need it for the go off to Falconer last year to make up the difference. Thank you.
